How is Our School Development Plan Used?

- Guides ongoing assessment and review of goals and actions.
- Our school development plan is the driver for closing learning gaps and informs:
 - Instructional strategies
 - Professional learning
 - School structures and processes for learning
 - Resources to improve student learning
 - Data-informed decision making





School Development Plan – School Goal

Through task-design based on formative assessment information, student well-being and achievement will improve.





School Development Plan – Outcomes

- Student achievement in reading will improve.
- Student well-being with regards to self-regulation will improve.







School Development Plan – Outcome Measures

- CC3 screening assessment, grades 1-3
- Report Card ELAL indicator related to Reading, grades
 1-5
- Report Card Physical Education and Wellness (PEW) indicator "Develops/ Demonstrates skills to support the well-being of self and others.
- Our School Data "Students with positive self regulation", grades 4 & 5
- Alberta Education Assurance Survey Results "Percentage of students who are satisfied that students model the characteristics of active citizenship"







School Development Plan – Data for Monitoring Progress

- MAZE reading assessment (grades 4 & 5),

- Our School survey, October & May
- Teacher and student self-regulation survey,

School Development Plan – Actions

Learning Excellence Actions:

- Use formative assessment data to design learning tasks with multiple entry points.
- Explicit instruction using UFLI program to improve phonological awareness and decoding text.
- Incorporate key components of a comprehensive vocabulary program into literacy instruction: provide rich and varied language experiences, foster word consciousness, teach word-learning strategies, teach individual words





Well-being Actions

- Design learning tasks that incorporate opportunities for students to engage in regulation strategies in order to prepare for learning
- Provide spaces for students to engage in regulation strategies
- Explicit Social Emotional Instruction to model and increase students' self-awareness and self-management (ability to regulate) for learning
- Activate students as owners of their own learning by engaging learners in goal setting, self-assessment, and/or reflection
- Provide repeated opportunities for learners to practice and consolidate literacy skills and knowledge
- Use technologies intentionally and purposefully that support literacy practices and represent learning





Truth & Reconciliation, Diversity, & Inclusion Actions

- Design student and staff learning tasks that intentionally activate the spirit, heart, body, and mind
- Incorporate explicit vocabulary instruction for English as an Additional Language learners who are identified at a LP1 and LP2 overall benchmark level
- Utilize and provide access to inclusive, linguistically diverse, culturally diverse, and inviting texts
- Consider student identity in task design and text selection





Professional Learning Actions

- Maatoomsii'Pookaiks: System Indigenous Education professional learning day- designing learning through ethical space
- CBE K-6 Professional Learning Series: How does the assessment process build hope, efficacy, and achievement for all learners?
- Watch the EAL Quick Byte Video "Pre-Teaching Vocabulary"
- Support from CBE EAL team to provide PD on high impact vocabulary strategies for inclusive classrooms

Our School Budget

- Our school received \$3 852 121 in 2024-25 to provide a quality education to our students and meet the goals in our school development plan (SDP).
- At least 75 per cent of budgeted funds covers staffing and the remaining portion covers instructional and operational supplies.





Our 2024-25 School Budget

 Our current student enrolment is 645 students. On September 30 of the current year, our school enrolment was 604 students.

The supplies/ other amount is inclusive of approximately \$24000 spent on additional support staff during the month of September and early October.





Our 2024-25 School Fees

We will consult with families by outlining proposed activities for the upcoming year that may require a fee for cost recovery.

- Field trips: Telus SPARK, Heritage Park, Humane Society, etc. (additional field trips will be added through the year as opportunities are available).
- * Clubs: Orff the Wall club
- * Swimming: Grades 2 & 3 (still to be confirmed), BSFA will pay for the transportation costs. Parents will be responsible for the cost of the lessons.
- * In-school activities: No specific activities are planned thus far that would require a fee. Types of activities we may charge a fee for would be:
 - an Art, Phys. Ed. or science activity that requires specialized expertise, materials, or equipment
 - A special presentation or guest speaker







*Bayside School Fundraising Association (BSFA)

BSFA provides funding for a number of initiatives and activities at Bayside School, which helps to reduce costs for the school and for families. Some examples of costs that might otherwise require a fee include:

- Swimming costs will be offset. BSFA will pay for the transportation costs and parents will be responsible for the lesson fee.
- BSFA has provided funding to cover the full cost of 6 sessions of yoga for all students this year.
- BSFA has allotted \$100/ club for up to 5 clubs this year.
- BSFA has allotted up to \$2700 for a theatre performance for all students
- BSFA has allotted funds to pay for the bus for the Patrol picnic.







Our 2024-25 School Fees

The <u>School Fee Guide</u> lists approved minimum and maximum school-based fees for elementary schools.

Bayside school only charges fees that are well within these guidelines.





Our 2024-25 School Fees

- 2023-24 Report to Parents on Fees
- In cases when the fees paid do not cover the full cost of an activity, Bayside school covers the cost through our decentralized (school) budget.
